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President's Forward

This Biennial Report describes the many activities of the IOF during the past 2 years. I should like to highlight a few of these from a personal point of view.

Our longterm goal for the IOF is to increase the number of people enjoying orienteering. The role of the IOF is to help federations to achieve this by taking away the barriers and oiling the wheels. With this in mind, the increase in IOF membership to the magic 50 is a highlight of this period.

During this Congress period one of the main aims of the Council has been to achieve a higher profile for the IOF and orienteering. In this context, the inclusion of orienteering in the World Games in Akita, Japan and the incorporation of the WMOC in the World Masters Games 2002 in Melbourne are significant achievements. On both occasions orienteering will have the opportunity for TV exposure alongside other major world sports.

The Olympic Games is an important item on the Agenda of this year's General Assembly. The 1996-8 Congress period is notable for bringing the Olympic issue to the fore. I regard as extremely healthy the lively debates now going on. If we can unite around a single strategy we shall make progress towards our objective. To this end, a formidable, enlarged Olympic Project Group started work 8 months ago and we are beginning to see the results in the plans now being put before you.

During the past 2 years IOF has taken an increasingly active part in international suprasport bodies such as Association of Recognised International Sports Federations (ARISF) and the General Assembly of International Sports Federations (GAISF). Involvement with them is crucial to success on the Olympic front.

I welcome the open debate on an event format suited to the Olympic programme. I welcome also the appearance of the media-friendly Park World Tour, with which the IOF is liaising closely. Debate and creativity is important if our sport is to thrive and grow. The new Ranking Events, though still experimental, are significant in this regard. Growth and change also bring challenge, of course. We do have considerable work to do in the coming period to make the elite competition programme more satisfactory. The future of the World Cup, date conflicts, excessive cost and competition overload, must all be resolved.

Two years ago a big question before us was mountain bike orienteering. I am pleased to see this newest discipline developing steadily. Trail O has made progress too, and both these forms are seeking World Championship status at this Congress.

On a personal note, some of the most rewarding experiences of the past Congress period have been the achievements of our elite athletes. There have been some magical moments. Every gold medallist achieves something exceptional, but the joy of the Austrians on Lucie Bohm's win and the extasy of the Danish Relay team in Grimstad stick out in my mind as very special moments. Indeed, Norway organised a memorable World Championship, worthy of our Centenary year. And with regard to our Centenary, I felt a moment of pride for our sport when other federations at the GAISF Congress congratulated us with the comment that their own centenary was still some years away.

Another magical moment for me was watching the ski-orienteers coming unerringly out of thick mist to the media control at the International Ski-O Events in Sugadaira, Japan. Knowing that various events of the Winter Olympics had to be postponed or cancelled because of similar weather, one comes to realise that our sport has unique selling points to exploit.

At the 1994 Congress we had just appointed a new Secretary General. Two years later I am pleased to report the fine work done by the Helsinki office, led by Barbro Ronnberg. I should also like to thank Finland for its continuous constructive support for our Secretariat.

During this Congress period we have been invigorated by the introduction of a dynamic new logo, whose clean lines and simplicity reflect the single-mindedness with which we must approach our work.

In closing I wish to give tribute to IOF's Committees and Council. With a paid staff of only 2 people, unpaid volunteers are vital to achievement of our objectives. The time and enthusiasm of Committee members is invaluable to the IOF. That every Council member has attended every Council meeting in the past 2 years (sometimes overcoming obstacles of finance, family obligations or sickness to do so) is a comment on the committment of your Council.

Council's Report

New model for forward planning

At the 1996 IOF General Assembly, the decision to replace the long-term plan "The IOF towards the Year 2000" with a more process-oriented planning model was taken. The main reason for this was the rapid development in a number of areas, such as the increase of members, the level of activity, and the development and establishment of new orienteering disciplines. Rapid development has brought a change of focus and new priorities, as well as made new demands on the way the IOF is organised and managed.

The 1996 General Assembly confirmed that IOF should take responsibility for all forms of orienteering, and that disciplines actively supported and administered by the IOF are foot, ski, trail and mountain bike orienteering.

In order to better reflect this situation, the structure of the IOF was changed. Four discipline committees were established to form the basic cornerstones of the organisation, and three cross-discipline committees (for map, events standards and technology development) were formed to support the discipline committees. Together with the Council and the Secretariat, these seven committees today form the basic structure of the IOF.

New roles and responsibilities

Compared with past practice, the new structure represents a rather radical change in the way of working, particularly with regard to roles and responsibilities. To speed up the work process itself, the Committees have been given extended responsibility for decision-making. The Committees have been authorised to take decisions on practical and technical matters, whilst Council has directed focusses on the development of policies and strategies, overall promotion of the sport, external relations, finance and resource allocation, management and follow-up of the work.

The Discipline Committees have taken on overall responsibility for both the administration and the development of the discipline within the framework of policies and guidelines provided by Council. Activities common to all disciplines have, however, been handled by the cross-discipline committees.

The new structure provides a clearer division of responsibilities than the former one. It does, however, also require closer co-operation between the groups and more frequent exchange of information. In order to facilitate this, Committee chairpersons have been invited to attend some of the Council meetings and for each Committee a Council member has been appointed to serve as a permanent liaison between Council and the Committee.

Change of Secretary General and new IOF Secretariat

Lennart Levin, SWE, served as Secretary General from the beginning of the Congress period until his retirement on 31 August, 1996. Barbro Rönnberg, FIN, was appointed new Secretary General and she started work on 1 September, 1996.

The two part-time employees Berit Pehrson and Karin Tibbelin continued their work at the IOF Secretariat at Sollentuna until the end of 1996.

In conjunction with the change of Secretary General, various options for a new location of the IOF Secretariat were investigated. After careful consideration, Council decided that the Secretariat be located at the Headquarters of the Finnish Sports Confederation in Helsinki from the beginning of 1997.

The official opening of the new office took place on 17th January 1997. A number of prominent guests took the opportunity to visit the office and wish the IOF Headquarters welcome to Finland.

During the Congress period, the process of getting the IOF registered in Finland as a legal body was started. (Initially the IOF was registered as an employer but not as a legal body). The registration is in line with the recommendations of the GAISF (General Association of International Sports Federations) and it provides a formal legal status for the IOF and the people involved. To finalise the registration process, certain Statutes changes must be ratified by the General Assembly.


Throughout 1997, the Secretary General was the only permanent employee at the Secretariat. Additional services were hired from the Finnish Sports Confederation's Service Unit or externally.

The positive experiences of the new set-up gained during this first year enabled Council to reallocate money within the 1998 budget from administration to other activities, in particular, development.

To enhance this work, Council decided to appoint a full-time Development Assistant. Sigitas Stasiulis, LTU, started work on 1 January 1998. His work is focussed on geographical spread, and on increasing and

strengthening IOF membership.

Launch of new IOF logo

In conjunction with the move of the IOF Secretariat, a new IOF logo was launched. The new symbol, designed by the Swedish graphic designer Anna Jonback, indicates positive progress and belief in the future. The control marker is common to all orienteering disciplines and was thus chosen as the main element of the logo. The colours - red and green - symbolise the red control marker and our green sports stadium, the forest.

New pictograms for the four disciplines were launched.

Progress towards the Olympics

The 1996 Congress passed a resolution charging the Council to work towards getting each of the disciplines into the relevant Olympic Games. A small working group headed by the IOF President was established to lead the work. This group worked out a strategy paper "Development towards the Olympics", which was endorsed by Council in April 1997.

The main theme of the 5th Presidents' Conference, held in conjunction with the 1997 World Championships was "Development towards the Olympics". The conference took place in Arendal, NOR, on 13 August. 66 people representing 29 member federations attended the conference and took the opportunity to express their opinions on the implementation of the Congress decision. There was considerable agreement that developing the sport and getting into the programme of the Olympics are complementary.

The second session of the Presidents' Conference was designed to start work on one of the development

aspects discussed under the first session: Raising orienteering's profile. This part of the conference was run in the form of a seminar led by Christel Pernet, Public Relations Advisor to the French Orienteering Federation.

Following the discussion at the Presidents' Conference, Council decided to strengthen the Olympic project by forming a new Olympic Project Steering Group including representatives of both IOF member federations and the athletes. Senior Vice President Åke Jacobson was asked to lead the group. The group has directed its efforts towards general development of the sport and on the task of achieving the numbers required in order to become eligible for the programme of the Olympic Summer Games. The work on developing new competition formats has mainly been a task of the respective discipline committees.

New means of communication – IOF Internet web site

In July 1996, the IOF Internet web site was introduced. The site was developed and maintained by the members of the former IOF High-tech group in co-operation with the IOF Secretariat. Since its introduction, the number of visitors has shown continuous growth. In early 1998, the web site was revised in order to give better service to visitors. According to recent information (March 1998), the number of visitors - successful requests - during one week was 31,375.

In early 1997, the developer of the IOF electronic calendar, Hans Steinegger, SUI, withdrew as the editor and in June 1997 Juha Lehtola, FIN, stepped in as new editor. In order to answer the needs of orienteers, the calendar is now updated twice a month if new information has been received.

In future, the IOF web site will play an important role as a fast means of communication and a complement to circular letters, newsletters, and other publications.

New role for Orienteering World

The efforts to raise the number of Orienteering World subscribers to 2,500 have not been successful, the circulation still being just under 1,200 copies per issue as in the past. Council has come to the conclusion that the target of raising the number of subscribers is unrealistic. This is partly due to considerable growth in the number of people having access to information on the web site, and partly to the fact that Orienteering World is not able to - and should not - compete with national orienteering magazines in the task of covering events and providing results service.

At its meeting in April 1998, Council therefore decided that, from the beginning of 1999, Orienteering World be changed into a PR magazine to be used as a tool for communication between the IOF and external

target groups. In future, Orienteering World will thus serve as a vehicle for delivering the message of orienteering to these groups. Subscriptions to Orienteering World will still be available for those individuals interested in receiving the magazine.

Throughout the Congress period, Orienteering World has been edited and produced by Clive Allen, under contract to the IOF. A standard 24-page issue has been published 6 times per year. From the beginning of the Congress period until April 1998, the magazine has been printed and dispatched in England. From the 1998/3 issue onwards, the printing and dispatch has been done in Finland. The reason for the change was the significant increase of costs due to the extremely unfavourable exchange rate between the Finnish Mark and the British Pound.

New Editors for Scientific Journal

The Scientific Journal of Orienteering aims to give an international and interdisciplinary review of current research in orienteering. It covers various aspects of the sport, medical, physiological, psychological, sociological, etc. and is directed at trainers, coaches, athletes and scientists.

The two scheduled issues for 1996 were published according to plan. Due to difficulties in acquiring relevant research material, the 1997 double issue was delayed and circulated in April 1998.

Editor of the publication during the period 1996–1997, as in all previous years since its inception in 1985, was Dr. Roland Seiler, SUI, assisted by an editorial board consisting of Toni Held, SUI, James Martland, GBR, and Torgny Ottosson, SWE. At the beginning of 1998, Dr. Seiler withdrew as Editor, and the task was taken on jointly by Toni Held and Torgny Ottosson.

Other forms of communication

The newsletter IOF Headlines, introduced in 1994, has been published only a few times during the Congress period. A post-Congress issue, summarizing the discussions and the decisions taken at Congress, was published in August 1996. In February 1997, an issue

describing the new IOF Structure was circulated, and in February 1998, an issue devoted to the theme "Development towards the Olympics" appeared, with a further issue scheduled for May 1998. The contents of the newsletter have also been published on the IOF Internet home page.

Four issues of the IOF Headlines will be published during 1998, and, in future, it will be issued on a regular basis, the number of scheduled issues per year being six.

In 1997, a small leaflet giving information on the IOF and on orienteering was published. The leaflet is directed at external target groups and can be used by both the IOF and by the national federations in addition to their own public relations material.

During the Congress period, press releases have been distributed to the national orienteering magazines, the GAISF magazine SporTVision, IOC and World Games publications as well as to international news agencies and newspapers.

100 years of orienteering

The first public orienteering event was held in Norway in 1897. Council therefore decided to announce the celebrations of the Centenary of Orienteering. The celebrations started at the 1997 World Championships in Norway and last for a whole year, ending at the 1998 World Cup Final in Finland in October.

All the major IOF events held during this period have been given the status of "Official Orienteering Centenary Events" and have been authorized to use the centenary logo in all publications and other material related to the event. All national orienteering federations have been encouraged to celebrate the centenary at a national level.

As part of the centenary celebrations, the IOF hosted a small reception at the 1997 GAISF Congress. The event proved very successful and was attended by a number of influential guests, including IOC members, and representatives of the IOC, ARISF and IWGA.

Number of IOF members now 50

As of 19 April 1998 the IOF has 50 member federations. Since the publication of the previous Biennial report, two new federations have been granted associate membership, namely Argentina and Chile. India and Moldova have been admitted by Council as provisional associate members; their membership will be proposed for confirmation at the 1998 General Assembly.

Requests concerning membership have been received from a considerable number of countries, China Taipei, Georgia, Greece, Kenya, Thailand, and The Philippines, to mention only a few of them. No formal applications have, however, been received by 19 April 1998.

In an effort to get new members, an increased number of people is now actively involved in giving



assistance to potential member countries and helping them through the membership application procedure.

To facilitate affiliation, Council decided to lower the membership fee for associate members from FIM 1,000 to FIM 200 and, additionally, agreed that the year of application shall be free of charge.

Relations with external sports bodies

The IOF is a member of GAISF (General Assembly of International Sports Federations), ARISF (Association of Recognized International Sports Federations), IWGA (International World Games Association), WMGA (World Masters Games Association) and a recognised federation of the IOC (International Olympic Committee). The IOF President Sue Harvey is a member of the IMGA Board of Governors.

During the Congress period, the IOF has participated in meetings and seminars organised by these external sports bodies and the IOF President and the Secretary General have met with representatives of the IOC.

In November 1997, the presidents of the recognised international sports federations were invited to a formal meeting with the IOC President, Mr. Samaranch. For the first time, the ARISF members have been invited to attend the annual meeting of the ASOIF (Association of Olympic Summer Sports Federations) as observers. The IOF President attended the meeting held in Sydney, Australia, in April 1998.

Due to a radical change in the role of the World Games, Council decided to seek inclusion of foot-orienteering in the 2001 World Games to be held in

Akita, Japan.

As one of the core sports, orienteering has been included in the programme of the World Masters Games from the very beginning. The number of orienteers participating in the WMG has been relatively low, though, partly because of the yearly IOF World Masters Orienteering Championships (former Veteran World Cup).

In order to raise orienteering's profile as part of this big international multi-sport event, Council took the decision that the WMOC be incorporated with the World Masters Games every fourth year, providing that the organiser is suitable and that the relevant national orienteering federation is willing and capable of organising the event.

In 1995, the IOF submitted to the IOC an application for inclusion of ski-orienteering in the programme of the 2002 Winter Olympic Games to be organised in Salt Lake City, USA. The IOC wants to assess the impact of additional athletes on the Games before taking the decision on the final programme of the 2002 Games. The decision on the possible inclusion of ski-orienteering will most likely be taken at the IOC Session to be held in June 1999.

In January 1998, an international ski-orienteering event was included in the official cultural programme of the Winter Olympic Games in Nagano, Japan. The event took place in Sugadaira one week prior to the Winter Olympics. The best athletes in the world were invited to participate in the event, which was excellently organised and also proved valuable by providing an opportunity to draw the IOC's attention to the sport.

Activities of IOF Committees

Foot-Orienteering Committee

The Foot-O Committee has met four times since its formation at the beginning of 1997. Its first task was to develop its terms of reference and, after an initial settling in period, these now include

Development of orienteering on foot, including all types of competition from Park-O to Mountain-O. In particular, a sub group of the committee is liaising closely with the Olympic Project Group with the specific goal of developing the format of "the Olympic event".

Responsibility for the IOF event programme: here the main activities have been developing the structure and scoring system of the 1998 World Cup programme and establishing the provisional structure of WC2000 also.

Apart from general monitoring of WOC, JWOC and WMOC, the other major work under this heading has been the establishment of the new IOF World Ranking scheme. This has involved the development from scratch of a sophisticated rankings formula requiring the establishment of an IOF competitor identification system as well as an IOF file format. N3sport of Norway were awarded the contract to run the ranking scheme and an initial rankings list is now available on their Web site.

Promotion: one of our main tasks is to promote (foot) orienteering in countries not federated to the IOF (and also in those which are federated but where experience is limited). So far, work has been done in the Balkans, the former Soviet Republics, Greece and Moldavia and many useful contacts have been established in these countries.

Information: summaries of FOC meetings are now available on the IOF Web site. The committee is actively promoting the IOF events programme with the media - in particular, the committee has produced an attractive brochure giving full details of all the 1998 World Cup events as well as JWOC98, WMOC98, all the 1998 World Ranking Events as well as key future events.

In 1997 Council agreed that marathon orienteering (long distance orienteering, rogaining etc) is an established form of orienteering and that international activities in this field are part of the responsibilities of the IOF. An international marathon orienteering event programme will be set up in the near future.

Mountain Bike Orienteering Committee

At the 1996 General Assembly in Jerusalem, mountain bike orienteering was adopted as an official IOF discipline. The MB-O steering group was formed in 1997. Its main task were to:

- Devise specific map symbols: these have been sent

on to the map committee.

- Develop an international competition calendar: competitions have been planned for the years leading up to 2002 when the group feels that the first World Championships should take place. Council has accepted this proposal and will put it before the 1998 General Assembly.
- Ongoing and future tasks:
- Work out specific competition rules
- Define the international and "Olympic" competition formats (distances, etc.)
- Produce documents (rules, guidelines and promotional material)
- Follow up the international development of the sport and answer requests for information.

MB-O practice world-wide has considerably evolved during the past 2 years. A 1996 enquiry showed that activity existed in 12 countries with 5 of these holding national championships. The 1998 picture shows activity in 18 countries with 12 national championships. 27 countries expect some development in the coming years and 11 of these feel that this development will be strong. At least 20 countries have declared their intention to take part in a prospective 2002 World Championship.

Ski-Orienteering Committee

The main activities of the Ski-Orienteering Committee were concentrated on questions around the Olympics.

During the period 1996-1998 main events were World Championships in Lillehammer 1996 and in Windischgarsten in 1998, World Cup 1997 and Junior World Championships in Poprad Tatry 1996 and in Velogoush in 1998, plus the international events in Sugadaira just before Nagano Olympic Games (see above) for which participation was sponsored by the organiser.

World Cup 1997 was organised by Sweden, Austria, Czech Republic and Russia. The final of the series was organised in Siberia. This was the first IOF main event in Ski-Orienteering held outside Europe in Krasnoyarsk, the organiser of Ski-O World Championships in 2000.

World Championships 1998 were organised by Austria in Windischgarsten. A new record for participating countries - 28 - was achieved. The organiser had some problems with lack of snow just before the event, but the Championships were carried out with some changes to the competition programme.

Junior World Championships 1998 were successfully organised by Russia in Velogoush.

The main focus has been the goal to get Ski-Orienteering included in Olympic Winter Games Programme in 2002 in Salt Lake City. The Olympic question is seen as a very important task and therefore the Ski-Orienteering Committee paid much attention to

developing the discipline and its events. One of the most important decisions was that the World Cup will be organised every year from 2000. This will give the possibility of getting more attention in the media. World Cup events can be combined with regional events, such as the North American Cup, Alpen Cup and Nordic Open Championships. World Championships events are also counted in the World Cup series.

The Ski-Orienteering Discipline has had a Development Programme since 1994 to support the Olympic Project. The Ski-Orienteering Committee has supported formal and informal clinics, training camps and Ski-O promotion on four continents. IOF instructors visited Japan, Australia, New Zealand, USA and Poland. During the last two years the committee has had success in getting new countries. In particular, Japan and Australia have started very strong programmes to develop ski-orientoeering outside Europe.

Junior World Championships will be organised every year from 1998 and World Masters Ski-Orienteering Championships will be organised for the first time in 1999 and then annually.

Ski-Orienteering Committee has carried out harmonising of the rules. New rules will be valid already during the season 1999.

A new medium distance will be developed in Ski-Orienteering for a number of reasons. The most important is the need for a shorter event than the old long distance but long enough to use the one-man-relay format. The medium distance is being tested with a view to use in the Olympic games and also in World Series. The short distance and the medium distance are alternatives in World Championships depending mostly on local terrain conditions. The medium distance will be included in the new rules.

Trail Orienteering Committee

The Trail O Committee has worked throughout the period towards achieving the criteria for acceptance as a participatory sport in the Paralympics.

The international rules have been published on the Internet and a hard copy made available to all Federations.

Sue Harvey and Anne Braggins attended the Paralympic Congress in Atlanta in August 1996, presenting a paper and holding a practical demonstration with local assistance.

The Trail O video was shown at the associated film festival. Since then 90 copies have been sold worldwide.

Clinics and demonstration events continue to be successful and the wider appeal of the discipline is now recognised.

The United States Orienteering Federation has formed an active committee and the demonstration in Minnesota during the Veteran World Cup stimulated interest in Japan.

Sixty six competitors representing 10 nations were in Grimstad for the Trail O events associated with

WOC97.

The Map Committee is working on guidelines for Trail O maps.

Event Standards Committee

Since it came into being at the start of 1997, the ESC has met on four occasions and kept in regular contact by email. A major achievement has been the revision of the Competition Rules for IOF Foot Orienteering Events, with the revised rules taking effect from 1 January 1998. These rules will be used as the basis for harmonising competition rules across the four orienteering disciplines. The ESC acts on behalf of Council in considering requests for rule deviations and in that capacity participated in the development of the Special Rules for the 1998 World Cup and approved the use of the SportIdent electronic punching system on a trial basis in IOF events in 1998.

Licensing and education clinics for Foot O controllers have been held throughout the two year period and throughout the world in the USA, New Zealand, Japan, Slovakia, Finland, Austria and Yugoslavia. The number of licensed Foot O controllers passed 100 at the end of 1998. A set of controlling norms has been established to guide the controlling of the major IOF events and considerable time has been devoted to the ongoing business of appointing and monitoring controllers.

Map Committee

The Map Committee is responsible for all matters related to maps for all orienteering disciplines. The tasks include standardisation, development, education and communication. It is the deciding body in matters related to deviations from the IOF Competition Rules on matters concerning maps.

The main task has been the ISOM2000 Project. The goal of this project is to present a revised International Standard for Orienteering Maps valid as of January 2000. The project is handled by a Map Committee Project Team, assisted by a group of internationally respected map experts involving members from three continents. The final standard will be harmonised, i.e. will for the first time include all the orienteering disciplines.

Further, a guideline for Park and Town Maps is being developed and will be presented during 1998. In conjunction with the revision of the IOF Competition Rules (1998) the MC has presented a document concerning its policies for handling the Foot-O map scale issue. The document states the clear intention to keep the profile of classic orienteering on the 1:15 000 scale, being very restrictive to accept deviations. For the short distance, 1:15 000 as well as 1:10 000 are accepted.

The map scale has caused some confusion and debate over the years. By declaring its firm policy, the MC hopes to bring clarity to the matter.

The modernising of the Instructors Kit was finalised

during 1998. The material is available on CD-ROM for use by instructors giving clinics in new as well as experienced orienteering countries. During the period a clinic has been arranged in Portugal 1997 with 15 participants from Portugal and Spain.

The 7th ICOM (International Congress for Orienteering Mapping) was traditionally held in conjunction with the World Orienteering Championships in Grimstad, Norway, in August 1997. The conference was the largest ever, with delegates from 15 countries. The two-day programme included project management, technical development, field excercises, the elite runners' view and a discussion about the ISOM2000 suggestions.

The IOF MC Official Information Center has been moved during the period to Budapest, Hungary. The Internet technique has proven extremely useful not only as a means for making information available externally, but also as an internal bulletin board to be used by the members of the different Project Teams. This makes it possible to spread participation in the MC projects to all parts of the world, all in the spirit of involving as many nations as possible in the IOF work.

Technology Development Committee

Information Technology is the core of the Technology Development Committee area of responsibility. Therefore, not surprisingly, the exponential evolution of electronic communication on the internet and related technologies have been major focus areas for the committee. The TDC is involved in building an IOF presence on the internet by developing the IOF home

page.

A very important use of technology to make orienteering more exciting for spectators is Real-time Position Monitoring. This is a technology that allows spectators to follow competitors' progress on the course in real-time. There are numerous uses for this technology, not least television and web casting.

So far the technology has been tested only experimentally. However, there are projects under way to develop large scale products. The TDC follow these projects closely.

With more electronic punching systems on the market it becomes increasingly important to ensure that such systems are reliable enough for use in important events. TDC closely follows the progress of the various systems and work with the Events Standards Committee in evaluating and approving the systems for use in IOF events.

The IOF Electronic Calendar is a very popular service for orienteers worldwide. Intended as a tool for orienteers who travel to foreign countries, the calendar seeks to gain a wide coverage of events. The latest addition is a new search engine that gives even easier access to the information.

The IOF has as one of its policies to make it less complicated to organise orienteering events. The TDC believe it can contribute to this in various ways. The TDC operates at the IOF home page an "Information centre" for use of technology in orienteering. This comprises an extensive list of technical articles as well as a list of available software. At the longer term level, the TDC work with equipment and software developers in order to define open standard interfaces so that disparate systems can be connected and work together.



WOC '97 - Controller's final report

WOC '97 was on the whole a very successful competition which has set exceedingly high standards for future WOCs. However, certain points should be noted as they may have some significance for major orienteering events.

Maps

The maps were up to required standards. The 1:10,000 scale maps were simple enlargements of the 1:15,000 scale maps (symbol enlargement of 50%) as recommended by ISOM. The organisers originally wished to print with a symbol enlargement of only 35% but the final result was held to be very satisfactory by all. These maps on very detailed terrain can be put forward as references for 1:10,000 scale maps.

Courses

- The courses for the qualification races were designed to be technically simpler than those of the finals so as to allow the less experienced competitors to have a chance of qualification. This was successful in that a large number of countries managed to qualify runners for all the finals.
- The courses for the short distance finals were excellent giving predicted winning times. The classic finals were too long, in particular for the men. This excessive length was compounded by the unexpected heat to give exceedingly demanding courses with a men's winning time 10 minutes in excess of predictions.
- The relay courses also turned out to be longer than predicted. They were also more difficult than expected judging from the large time differences between teams.

Course lengths were discussed at length during the year prior to WOC. Statistics from earlier competitions on similar terrain tended to suggest shorter courses than those that were planned. However, the course planners determined the winners' average running speeds on the basis of extensive test runs which were difficult to fault. The obvious lesson here is that statistics in this respect should not be neglected, and in particular if they suggest shorter distances than test runs.

Accommodation

The accommodation was of the required standards. However, some difficulties were experienced due to full booking which gave the organisers no lee-way to deal with a number of unexpected situations.

The jury

The jury had to deal with a number of protests. Most were simple with regard to the rules. A number of « punching » problems occurred. The fact that these always concerned less experienced countries shows that the EMIT system still allows for miss-punching. The general complaint is that there is no signal to witness a correct « punch ».

By far the most difficult and sensitive jury decision concerned the « counting down » be the speaker problem which everyone will remember. The judgement given by the jury seems to have satisfied a good majority of the orienteers present at WOC. It is clear that the very short time differences in short distance events call for more accurate timing. The EMIT system allows this if the units are used to their full capacity as timing equipment from start to finish. This use of the equipment was suggested to the organisers but they did not wish to depart so radically from standard practice.

Ceremonies

All the ceremonies were of a high standard. Unfortunately the organisers forgot to give 4th to 6th place prizes at the classic event prize-giving in spite of having been reminded. This was very elegantly made up for at the next prize-giving ceremony.

General

The error at the classic prize-giving was symptomatic of a number of less visible organisational problems that occurred during the events. It is useful to analyse the reasons for these.

The organisation was well structured according to the main tasks. In the run up to the event each responsible person worked very autonomously with his group to prepare his part of the organisation. These people were very competent but did not always have sufficient relations with each other which sometimes lead to a lack of harmonisation and ignorance of the requirements of others. In short, the organisation lacked a « chief executive officer » who would have had a centralised and detailed overview of all the aspects of the organisation. Fortunately, during the WOC week, the Chairman of the organising committee was available permanently and gave strong leadership.

The seventh edition of the JWOC'96 was held in Romania, at Govora (Valcea country). It was for the first time when Romania organised a world orienteering competition and we appreciate this event as a great challenge that was successful.

The Competition Centre of the event was the "Oltenia" hotel, one of the biggest hotel from Govora. All the competitors, team officials and organisers from the Information Desk were accommodated there, so it was possible for all to be in a permanent touch. The "Oltenia" hotel was a fortunate choice as it was situated among the three competition areas and also situated at 10 min. walking to the model event map.

The transport to the competition areas strictly respected the timetable scheduled. The maximum transport time to the competition areas was 50 min.

The maps were appreciated as very good and the terrain as very difficult from the technical point of view (especially the Classic and Model Event terrain's).

The courses were appreciated as very technical but too long (for Classic event). In the classic event (both men and Women courses), the realised winner time overdone the calculated winner time with 10 - 13 %. The reasons for this were: a) the undergrowth very developed in some areas because of the very wet last season; b) the rain during the course which made the terrain very muddy; c) the technical difficulty of the terrain.

There were organised four official meetings of about 20' - 30' for spreading useful information and holding the problems of the participants in order to be solved as quickly and as better as possible.

During the Relay event we had one verbal complain from the Croatia official leader. The last leg of the second team of Croatia who started within the mass start of the delayed latest legs (12h.20) got lost at the end of the course. One hour and a half after the team officials mass start (12h.30), after all the team official competitors passed through all the controls, some of the controls were removed, so that the runner from Croatia2 didn't find one control. Because that control was indeed removed before the runner to arrive there, we decided to not disqualify the runner (and the team). This decision didn't affect the ranking, the Croatia2 being anyway the last ranked in the Relay event.

There were not protests during the JWOC'96.

Conclusions: We consider the JWOC'96 - Romania to be successful.

IOF asked us to perform a JWOC 97 where every nation could be together in a very friendly environment. It started immediately during the opening ceremony, each Junior discovering the other, whatever the nations, the languages, the O experience, etc... This special atmosphere continued during the meals, the evenings, and the competition itself.

Another important objective was to organise a JWOC at a reasonable cost. With the help of the Belgian Army, we succeed.

Geir Tveit, IOF controller, gave us big help, asking some modifications difficult to implement but always judicious (like the decision to switch the maps scheduled for short distance and classic). The JWOC where interesting also due to this Geir's work.

The 3 terrains (sandy with a lot of contours and a lot of paths) lead to Junior World Champions without contest.. From a Belgian point of view, one girl and one men where along the best, at a right place.

Problems ? Let us remember the 2 first days when it took a little bit to much time to received the meal ...

Our thanks to a Doctor, member of the Finish delegation who gave the first help to one of the competitors. In the future, we, and every organisator, will take more and more attention to the medical problems.

Thanks a lot to all the Juniors because, finally, they made from this organisation a big success. In the same way we wish an equal success to our French friends for their JWOC organisation this year !

We, in Belgium, from the North to the South of the country, hope to meet a lot of young (and, why not oldiers) orienteers during our next organisations.

Introduction:

In spite of lack of snow to start off with, the 1998 World Championships could be held in their entirety. The organisers had prepared alternative venues at higher altitude, which had to be turned to due to a shortage of snow in the valley. This also accounted for the program being changed: first the sprint event, then the relay, finishing with the long-distance. IOF IC Anssi Juutilainen ensured that the World Championship events ran smoothly; thanks to his vast experience there were no problems.

Sprint event (January 21st, 1998)

The sprint event was held at the famous downhill world cup location Hutterer Höss in Hinterstoder, which is at 1500 m above sea level. The area is reached via gondola cable car, and the competitors had to take a drag lift to the start. The weather was windy with snowfall, which was why the winning times in both the women's and men's classes were 10 to 15 minutes longer than specified by the IOF. The top racers won though; no medals were taken by coincidence.

Relay (January 23rd, 1998)

The relay was held in the Egglalm area on the Hengst pass. A shuttle bus transported the competitors to the start/finish area from the car park. The men's race started at 10:00 and the women's race at 10:15. Due to the change in program, and on the agreement of the IOF IC Anssi Juutilainen and the jury, the courses were shortened. A marquee large enough for 500 people was set up at the start/finish area for changing. Thanks to a massive effort by everybody involved, this race was also carried out without problems or any complaints. Long distance (January 24th, 1998)

The final race of the 1998 World Championships in ski orienteering was the long distance event, which was also held in the Egglalm area on the Hengst pass. This time a larger area was used to take in Puglalm and Laussabauernalm. What was special about this event was the sheer distance between controls, providing an interesting choice of routes, and the amount of climbing! The start/finish area was the same as for the relay event. This race was also carried out without any problems or protests. Opening ceremony (January 20th, 1998):

The 1998 World Championships were opened on the main square in Windischgarsten in the presence of a number of personalities. The national teams were greeted individually as they processed into the square. In addition to the addresses and music, Dr. Leitl, the Assistant Governor of the province of Upper Austria, officially opened the championships. As Vice President of the federation, Hugh Cameron from Australia then welcomed the 28 participating nations on behalf of the IOF. Doughnuts and hot drinks were served to the participants during a fireworks display that formed the finale of the ceremony.

Prize giving ceremony, closing ceremony:

The prize giving ceremonies were held on Lanzaplatz in Windischgarsten in the evening after each event. The appropriate national anthems for the champions were played live by the Windischgarsten brass band. During the closing ceremony the mayor Franz Hufnagl handed over the 100 year-old IOF baton to the President of the IOF Sue Harvey. Event Organiser and General Manager Karl Lex also handed the World Championship flag over to Sue Harvey.

As requested by the participants, the event finished with an evening in the night club.

Doping:

A total of 18 doping samples were taken during the World Championships by the ÖDAC; all samples proved negative.

Mascot:

The event mascot was a bear called „SKIO“, who turned out to be very popular with the participants and spectators. SKIO attracted more attention from photographers than anything or anybody else.

Music:

The „World Championship March“ was written especially for this event by the well-known Spittal am Pyhrn composer Bruno Sulzbacher.

Other attractions:

A number of local organisations helped stage additional attractions such as a hunting museum, an exhibition of stamps from all 30 nations that registered to compete, and a church service for the participants held by the Austrian „Sport Bishop“ Dr. Kurt Krenn. Unfortunately most participants found there was little time in our tightly scheduled race program for many of these attractions.

Ready for the Olympics:

At the invitation of the organisers the promises made at the IOF congress in Varna, BUL in 1994 were kept: for the first time more than 25 nations - 28 to be precise - attended.

Press:

The Austrian press gave the event more coverage than would normally be expected (see attached). Austrian television made a number of short reports during the World Championships week, and transmitted a 20 minute summary of the event during coverage of the Olympics in Nagano. The championships received attention from radio stations for a period of 14 days.

REPORT

by *Stanislav Elakhovsky* - controller of the Ski-Junior World Orientiring Championship-98, Russia, Tula region, Velegozh, February 23-28, 1998.

Ski-JWOC-98 was arranged on the high level of organisation. Accomodation, food, short distances to start and finish areas, opening and closing ceremonies, rewarding ceremonies, information service for participants and spectators, cultural programme, referee level, representation of IOF officials - in total was in accordance with modern international standarts and the Competition Rules for IOF Events.

From sport-technical point of view Ski-JWOC-98 was perfectly arranged with exellent maps and routes preparation. All participants had possibility to train on the large training area that was very similar to the event area. This training area was then used in maps and routes of all event days. This way of training organisation for participants as "model event" has already applyed to large Ski-O events (for example to the North Countries Ski-O Junior Championship in 1994, Rovaniemi, Finland) and can be considered as rather sucessful.

As non-homogeneous qualification structure of Ski-JWOC-98 participants had been awaited, technically rather simple routes was prepared. Different weather conditions was taken into consideration for routes planning including situation of frosty weather just after thaw, when hard snow cover forms. Such weather in fact took place during Ski-JWOC-98. This made event routes technically more difficult bringing additional factors in route choice task - that is clear from the winners ways on event maps, presented in Ski-JWOC-98 Report, and also from route time schedule of participants, printed on back side of maps and given them during event.

Should be underlined that sunny and frosty weather, hard snow cover and hard ski tracks (there were no tracks left by previouse participants) provided ideal conditions of fair sport during all event days. It is confirmed by the fact, unique for such large-scale Ski-O event, that among the best ten results and even among the medalists were sportsmen from the beginning of the start list.

The resolution passed by referee board on abolishmet of Russian women team and Finish men team results in relays in cause of infringement the p.20.7 of the Competition Rules for IOF Events was right and fair. This resolution was then confirmed by jury.

Mr. Plamen Denev, IOF representative, managed with his duties rather sucessful as higher qualified specialist.

Conclusions and recommendations:

1. Ski-JWOC-98 was arranged on the high organisational and sport-technical level.
2. Tula Orienteering Federation, Ski-JWOC-98 officials, routes planners and referees showed themselves as responsible and qualified specialists who are able to arrange on the modern level any large-scale international event, as winter as summer.
3. The use of the same area as for the main event as for the model event in a day before should be considered as right and laying in the mainstream of the current development tendencies of Ski-O and orienteering on the whole. It's worth-while to recommend to do by the same way arranging large-scale events including international events and even to expand model event area till to the *whole* main event area. I think it more corresponds to the principles of fair sport and economized event arrangement than outside training area.
