EDITORIAL



t's It's time to reminisce about the year that was, and to look forward in fond anticipation. On the doorstep to 2011, the International Orienteering Federation has a particularly good reason to look back, not only at the past

year, but at the past five decades. In 2011, the International Orienteering Federation celebrates its 50th anniversary.

A lot has happened since ten national orienteering federations – Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, DDR, Finland, Hungary, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland and West Germany – founded the IOF in Copenhagen, Denmark on 21st May 1961.

Today, orienteering is practised on all continents. The number of member federations has grown steadily and is currently 71, Barbados being the youngest member.

Today, the IOF governs four orienteering disciplines – foot orienteering, mountain bike orienteering, ski orienteering and trail orienteering. The first World Orienteering Championships were held in 1966. Almost ten years later, in 1975, it was time to stage the inaugural World Ski Orienteering Championships. The first ever World Championships in Mountain Bike Orienteering and Trail Orienteering were held in 2002 and 2004 respectively.

Today, the international competition programme comprises not only the world championships, but also world cup, world championships for juniors and masters, continental regional championships and world ranking events.

Orienteering is now also on the programme of several multi-sports events.

New competition formats have been developed and GPS tracking brings the drama out of the forest to the spectators in the arena and to TV viewers and those following the event on-line on their computer screens.

So what does the future hold for the IOF? More member countries, new and exciting event formats, new technology and even more increased visibility? The work to develop and spread the sport continues. New success stories can be expected in coming decades.

Change is on the horizon

The world of orienteering is currently characterised by innovation and heightened expectation, as key policies are furthered and realised.

The aim of the IOF is to spread, strengthen and develop orienteering – actively promoting our sport throughout the world and bringing it to more people in more places. There is a strong commitment to raising the profile of the sport by staging high quality, highly visible events and increasing the presence and credibility of orienteering on the world sporting stage.

The successful 26th World Orienteering Championships held in August 2010 in Trondheim, Norway showed that we have come far in realising these ambitions. Athletes from a record 42 of the 50 countries eligible to participate took part in the event. All six IOF regions were represented.

Athletes from 15 countries were placed among the 20 best in the three individual races for men and 11 countries were among the 20 best in the individual races for women. When the relay is included, 21 and 20 countries respectively were represented among the 20 best in the men's and women's races — a clear indication that our sport is developing rapidly around the world. Such fast, widespread development is helping to increase the visibility of the sport, raising the profile and attracting new recruits and the attention of media, sponsors and the general public.

The 25th IOF General Assembly was held in conjunction with the World Orienteering Championships in Trondheim. Several important decisions were taken to promote and support change and innovation in our sport. The Assembly approved a proposal to replace the previous two types of membership with just one. All members are now eligible to take part in the World Orienteering Championships and the World



Cup, which increases the number of potential participants from the previous 50 to 71. This will further increase our sport's credibility on the world sporting stage.

The Assembly also confirmed the IOF Council's policy concerning participation in the World Masters Games, which together with The World Games provides an excellent opportunity to showcase orienteering to a wider audience and to sports officials in other sports organisations.

The Mediterranean federations informed of their intention to form a Confederation of Orienteering Federations of the Mediterranean Sea and to seek inclusion in the Mediterranean Games. Both initiatives will make orienteering more visible in multi-sport events and help new countries in developing the sport.

The IOF Council recently made a comprehensive evaluation of our elite events. The key outcome was that the

current programme remains a valid foundation to ensure that our sport has a series of world events with high attraction value. The evaluation also shows that we have managed to significantly increase the visibility of our sport.

We need, however, to further develop our competition models and discipline formats to reach a wider audience through TV and webcasting media. We must continue our initiatives to make our sport easier to understand and more exciting to watch. Our prime TV product, the World Championships, must be further shaped to better attract today's demanding sports audience.

The IOF Council presented to the General Assembly in Trondheim some principles for the future development of the World Orienteering Championships. The principles received support from the delegates, and a project group has now been set up to develop a detailed programme for a new World Championships week. A draft programme will be presented to the Presidents' Conference in 2011. The General Assembly also approved a proposal from Norway to introduce mass start in the World Orienteering Championships.

Within a short period of time we can expect to have a new and more thrilling World Championships programme.

Mass and chase starts are easier for the audience to follow and understand, and a mixed relay will add a new dimension to the current formats.

There is certainly change on the horizon!





Andrey Khramov welcomes visible formats

ndrey Khramov likes new orienteering formats and running in front of a big audience but he also enjoys traditional distances. The Russian now has gold from six successive World Orienteering Championships.


"My future with map and compass? Orienteering is my life and I still want to continue for many years. I intend to go for The World Games in Colombia in 2013", he says.

The incredible Russian has won a gold medal at the World Championships every year since 2005. This year he won relay gold together with his team mates Valentin Novikov and Dmitry Tsvetkov. It was the third relay victory for Russia since 2006 and Andrey has been in all the winning teams.

Sprint more demanding than you think

Andrey was the first Russian ever to win gold at the World Orienteering Championships. The first of his three individual golds was taken at the long distance in Japan in 2005. Andrey has been called a sprint specialist: one of his six golds is from a forest sprint and another from a city sprint. He also won the sprint at The World Games in Kaohsiung, Chinese Taipei, in 2009. At this year's World Championship sprint Andrey was number eight, 14.6 seconds behind the winner. Matthias Müller from Switzerland. The Russian made some mistakes at the beginning and the middle of the race.

"When you look at the map it looks easy but with such high speed in sprint it is very challenging. There is no margin for error. At most you can miss five to ten seconds. On long distance you can still fight for gold even if you have lost a minute or two, but on the sprint you have to be focused all the way and make no mistakes."

Enjoys a crowd

Andrey's World Championships sprint win in 2008 in Olomouc, Czech Republic and this year's sprint in Trondheim were both in city centres, with the finish in the main square.

"It's good to have sprint in the cities. A lot of people can get a sense of what orienteering really is and see the runners in action. I like running in front of an audience. For beginners, sprint in parks and city centres is also a good way to learn to navigate. Not everybody is eager to start with orienteering in the forest. If the speed isn't so high it is also much easier", he says.

Reforms on the way

The International Orienteering Federation has established a working group to review the World Orienteering Championships programme. The new programme shall continue to be a maximum of eight days. Both mass start and a mixed relay comprised of

both genders are under consideration. There is already a mixed relay in The World Games; Russia won that event last year in Kaohsiung, Chinese Taipei.

"The mixed relay is a really good format. Mass start is also interesting but I think a long distance mass start will need forking to be successful. Anyway I would like to see both mass start and mixed relay in future events that would be a plus on what we have today. Even though I enjoy being in a mixed team, I would also like to see a team with all runners of the same gender. That's the tradition", Andrey says.

Clear focus

For the coming World Orienteering Championships the Russian will concentrate on the sprint and relay.

"I will run more sprint and more 3000 and 5000 metre track and field to strengthen my sprint skills", he



Mayor Rita Ottervik:

A show for spectators

he 2010 World Orienteering Championships in Trondheim, Norway was an incredible experience for the Mayor of the city. Rita Ottervik really engaged in the orienteering spectacle.

"Many positive things have happened with orienteering as a spectator friendly sport in the last years", says Rita Ottervik, Mayor of the third largest city in Norway with 171000 people located in the municipality.

Rita Ottervik has been the Mayor since 2003. Four years ago, she was in Denmark when Trondheim presented its World Orienteering Championships plans. She determined to capture the excitement of orienteering.

"Those of us from Trondheim talked about how we could make the sport even more spectator-friendly", she says. "The runners must be visible, not only at the finish. You must know what is happening in the forest as it happens. For example, we watched live as the French runner on the last leg at the World Championship relay in Trondheim ran from the 16th to the 18th control. That was exciting."

Festive atmosphere

In addition to the opening and closing ceremonies, the Mayor was present at all finals.

"I really wanted to be there. It was interesting, fantastic, engaging and exciting. I was really surprised by the spectacle", she says.

She enjoyed the sprint but really liked the races at the ski stadium Granåsen.

"Middle and relay were the very best of the week. The sprint was over so quickly. In Granåsen you were more involved. There were so many people and a festive atmosphere."

There were 30000 spectators during the week. At the sprint final in the centre of Trondheim there were 10000 spectators.

Future orienteering

Because of her experiences at the World Orienteering Championships, Rita Ottervik is now interested in following the future plans of orienteering.

"Mass start is something to think about: it is important to have something happening all the time. In Trondheim people not so familiar with orienteering watched the events, and that was very positive for the sport. Orienteering has become more recognised and accepted among the population. As a part of the games in Trondheim there was also a school sprint and orienteering featured in the schools. Orienteering is part of



leisure activity."

An avid supporter

Before the games the Mayor knew mainly the local orienteering stars. Now, after the World Championships, she is familiar with the world's best orienteers and has eagerly followed orienteering in the local newspaper Adresseavisen. She hasn't actively participated in the sport but learnt to navigate in her childhood and has passed on her knowledge to her son.

"It's more interesting to find controls out in the forest rather than just walking", she says.

Rita Ottervik welcomes more orienteering events in Trondheim. "Every major sporting event is important for both the sport and the organising city. The municipality appreciates the publicity that comes with people visiting and circulating TV pictures around the world."





Vladimir Gusiatnikov half a world away from Trondheim, Norway was a spectator at the World Orienteering Championships. He watched the events on his computer.

Vladimir followed the action for 10 to 15 hours during the championships in Norway. Due to the time difference it was almost the middle of the night.

"I followed the Trondheim World Orienteering Championships from the couch in my apartment in San Francisco, USA, before going to work every day. It required getting up early sometimes but such is life. I enjoyed

it because I got a close-to-real-time understanding of what happened in the forest", he says.

The possibility to follow what the runners were doing in real time – with the help of GPS tracking – was what Vladimir liked best, but it was also good to get split and radio times, arena audio commentary and video.

The homepage of the World Orienteering Championships had up to 30000 visitors every day. The average for all eight World Championships days was 25000. 1200 bought the service of receiving live tracking from the finals. Others simply accessed the speaker and live photos.


Gusiatnikov liked both what he saw and the commentary.


"I think that the speaker, Kjell-Erik Kristiansen, was very good", he says.

A devoted follower

Gusiatnikov likes to compete, but his main involvement with orienteering is as an organiser. He is an IOF Event Adviser and has started an event organisation company.

"My main competition focus is rogaining which is 24 hour navigation and endurance racing. Normally I go to the World Orienteering Championships to spectate. I also attend the Jukola relay in Finland almost every year, and find the World Orienteering Championships and Jukola the most exciting to follow. I was at the World Orienteering Championships in 1993, 2003, 2004, 2007 and 2008, but this year I didn't have enough vacation time to make the trip. Luckily I could follow the events live online."





Orienteering on TV - great potential




orienteering is rapidly developing into a sport for television. The last 6 years have seen a number of high-quality TV productions.

In 2008, the World Orienteering
Championships productions were
made by National Czech Television
with Karel Jonak as host broadcaster
director. Jonak is a very experienced
sports producer with FIS Nordic
World Ski Championship, FIBA World
Championship for Women, World Cup
events in skiing, cycling, gymnastics,
volleyball and several Olympic Games
to his credit. He is the recipient of two
prestigious awards from Fédération
Internationale Cinéma Télévision
Sportifs (FICTS) Sport Movies & TV
Challenge.

A new model for production

Karel Jonak has been producing orienteering on TV since 2007 and he is enthusiastic about recent developments in orienteering

broadcasting in Czech Republic.

"For us, the catalyst was the successful live TV production of the World Championships 2008. Thanks to the cooperation between the head office of Czech TV, the organising committee, course setters and others, we realised our vision of creating a new model for live TV production of orienteering. Since then, another two World Championships have been successfully televised, which has meant that TV stations have begun to recognise that orienteering is attractive to a TV audience."

No room for being average

Jonak had little experience of orienteering when he began to plan the World Orienteering Championships production for 2008. He had intended to take a look at earlier TV productions of orienteering and then decide what to do. However, he quickly found out that there were few examples of complex orienteering productions. Therefore, he decided to basically create the production model from scratch.

"What I try to avoid is being average. I start planning as early as possible

Jonak believes that orienteering can compete with established and attractive TV sports.

and I am always thinking about the added value of the production. A good relationship between TV, course planners and the organising committee saves money and can prevent many problems. Then you need emotions, nice pictures and the story. To give you an example, the drama at the World Orienteering Championships relay has in the last three years been beyond price."

A regular TV sport

Nowadays the Czech Orienteering Championships are broadcast regularly and the sprint is always live. Both the sprint and middle distance from this year's World Orienteering Championships featured in the broadcasting schedule. A couple of months ago Czech TV started preparations for next year's World Cup.

"I am proud to tell you that orienteering has become a regular TV sport in the Czech Republic", Karel Jonak says.

A bright future

According to Jonak, there is nothing to stop orienteering from becoming even more visible on TV. The viewer ratings of orienteering in the Czech Republic are already equal to basketball, volleyball, and horse racing. And it is not only on TV that orienteering is popular, Karel Jonak points out.



"We should not forget the internet audience. The situation has changed and live TV is not the only means of viewing TV programs. Each orienteering competition is viewed by between 20 and 30 thousand people on the Czech TV website."

Jonak believes that orienteering has great potential and a bright future as a sport for live TV.

"The fact that you simply cannot tell the story just by using TV cameras gives you the possibility to vary the product and utilise multi-media. Using GPS tracking and other technologies in the right way we can create a unique and attractive mixture for the TV audience. Of course, you have to educate the TV spectators to watch orienteering: there should be an all year TV production model to keep the sport at the forefront of people's minds and to ensure continuity. All in all, I am very confident that orienteering can be as attractive for TV as, for example, biathlon or cross country skiing."

Yle believes in orienteering

Markku Jylhäsalo, Head of Sport at Finland's national public service broadcasting company, Yle, agrees with Karel Jonak about the potential of orienteering as a TV sport.

"Orienteering is an interesting sport with great values. In Finland it attracts a large audience: the World Orienteering Championships 2010 had more than 220 000 viewers. This is over 20% of the market share and that is a really good result."

The World Orienteering Championships attracted a larger audience in Finland than the traditionally very popular Formula 1 and UEFA Champions League.

On the right track

Markku Jylhäsalo compliments recent developments in orienteering that have made the sport more spectator friendly. According to Jylhäsalo, TV broadcasts of orienteering have significantly improved and today's course planners take TV well into account.

"Orienteering has really developed into a good sport for TV", Jylhäsalo says.

In addition to the World Orienteering Championships, Yle, this year, broadcast an all night live production of the Jukola relay and all three World Cup events of the Nordic Orienteering Tour. "We aim to show as much orienteering in the future", Jylhäsalo confirms. In 2013, Yle will broadcast all finals of the World Orienteering Championships in Finland.

"The World Championships in Finland are a big challenge for both the organiser and Yle. We are going to utilise all available tools and expertise to reveal what is happening in the forest. We are eager to develop orienteering broadcasting."

from 43 nations took part in the Games. This was a significant milestone for ski orienteering and for the IOF: it gave ski orienteering valuable experience of multi-sports games, and proved that the sport is an excellent option for such games. Athletes and media were enthusiastic about the event. CISM has confirmed that ski orienteering will continue to be part of future Winter Games, which are organised every fourth year.

Eivind Tonna won a silver medal in Italy. "For me as an athlete, the Winter Military World Games were an awesome experience. So many athletes, so many interesting sports events, and an excellent ski orienteering race. Several nations came to us afterwards to ask how to train for ski orienteering, and some even commented that this may be the ultimate military sport."

But this is just the beginning. In March 2011, ski orienteering will be part of the Asian Winter Games in Kazakhstan. The Asian Winter Games is a multisport event for members of the Olympic Council of Asia, and it is organised every fourth year. Ski orienteering will be present in Kazakhstan with four formats: sprint, middle, long distance and relay.

The IOF is also currently investigating the possibilities of ski orienteering becoming part of the FISU Winter Universides.

New formats

Recent format development has been accomplished with visibility in mind. The IOF Athletes' Commission has been closely involved in the development of the new formats.

"Sprint and mixed sprint relay have proven to be extremely attractive competition formats that appeal to the athletes as well as to spectators and media. Our events fit nicely into a 45-minute TV broadcast and they utilise the latest technology such as GPS tracking", says Eivind Tonna.

Sprint relay will be used for the first time at World Championships level next year in Sweden. According to the IOF Senior Event Adviser, Carl Fey, the plans for the World Championships 2011 are progressing well. "We are excited about the introduction of the sprint relay at the World Ski Orienteering Championships. It will be a very fast-paced and exciting race for both athletes and spectators", Carl Fey says.

GPS tracking on big screen

The World Ski Orienteering
Championships 2011 will feature a
large screen and GPS tracking. With
tracking the competitors are always in
sight even when they are in the forest.
"New developments reveal the drama
of ski orienteering to spectators and
media. Imagine this: the spectators

follow the competitors' race through the forest on the big screen. They can see the tracking and the audience knows the best route; everyone knows, except the skiers, who have to make the route choices at full speed throughout the race", Eivind Tonna says.

Eivind Tonna is optimistic about the future. "I believe that the road we have taken is the right one. Now we just have to work even harder. We have a great sport and interesting formats. What we do on skis, you cannot see in any other sport. This we will show to spectators and media."

You never run alone

GPS tracking brings the spectators to the forest

t the first control on the last leg of the mixed relay at The World Games all the spectators and the team mates of Linnea Gustafsson realised that the chance of gold was now slipping away. The anticipation and tension climbed rapidly.

"We were fighting for victory and uncharacteristically Linnea made a mistake at the first control", Kajsa Nilsson says.

Kajsa was one of Linnea Gustafsson's team mates at The World Games in Kaohsiung in Chinese Taipei in 2009.

Sweden was second, only 13 seconds behind Russia after three legs of the mixed relay. The day before, the Swedish last leg runner had won her first individual international medal. Things looked good for the team when the last leg runners disappeared from the view. In the past, the spectators would now have waited 20-25 minutes to see what had happened in the forest and who would win the relay, but GPS tracking has changed everything: it has made the invisible visible. With Linnea no longer in sight, everyone, especially the Swedish team, excitedly followed the tracking of the runners on the big screen.

A defining moment

Linnea had appeared nervous. Spectators all over the world – those present at the Games and those watching at their computer screens witnessed the moment it happened: Sweden's last leg runner made a mistake on the very first control. A mistake that would cost the team victory.

"I can't remember if I was thinking about being tracked when I missed the control. I try not to remember negative happenings but tracking is definitely something that is good for the spectator friendliness of orienteering", says Linnea who finished her first major international relay as number eight.

Despite the disappointment, Linnea learnt a lot from the experience. Later in the same year she won a silver medal at the World Orienteering Championships.

The excitement of tracking

"Tracking is really something to use in

big competitions", says Kajsa Nilsson. "Tracking captures critical moments in the competition and really adds to the excitement. It is at times nerve-racking to watch the mistakes of your team mates when there is nothing you can do about it."


But tracking does not only show mistakes, it also helps by providing the spectators with information on what is the smartest thing to do in the forest. With tracking it is easier to compare different route choices and tracking can, of course, also be used in training to gain experience and knowledge.

At this year's World Championships long distance race, the spectators followed live the route choices of the runners. François Gonon, France, had been running ahead of his team mate Thierry Gueorgiou the entire race when he chose a slower route at the very end, to the 21st control. The spectators saw in real time that this route choice cost François the bronze, which would have been his second individual World Championships medal.

Orienteering at the home of the Sydney Olympic Games

eing on the programme of big multi-sports games is a means of showcasing the sport to a wider audience. The World Masters Orienteering Championships have now been combined with the World Masters Games three times, in 2002, 2005 and 2009.

Just being on the programme of the Games is not enough. Showing strength in terms of the number of participants is important. With 1149 competitors representing 32 countries, orienteering was the ninth biggest of the 28 sports on the programme of the Sydney 2009 World Masters Games. With almost 80% of the participants from abroad. orienteering also provided about 10% of the total number of international competitors at the Games.

Unique sprint arena

The long distance orienteering events took place near Lithgow, some 140 km west of Sydney, while the sprint events were held in downtown Sydney. The venue of the qualification was Macquarie University and the final

was staged in the Sydney Olympic Park. The sprint events really brought orienteering out of the forest and into the very centre of the Games. The participants also enjoyed the unique opportunity to experience an Olympic arena. As one competitor commented after the Games: "I really enjoyed these two events, in particular having the final at the Sydney Olympic Park."

"From the very beginning, the vision of the local organisers of the World Masters Orienteering Championships was that the sprint event should be held in a high profile, visible location", says Shane O'Leary, Chief Executive Officer of the Sydney 2009 World Masters Games.

"For a long time the desire of the organisers, with our support, was to host the sprint in the Botanic Gardens adjacent to Sydney Harbour with the Opera House and Bridge as a backdrop. Regrettably it wasn't possible to realise this vision. I would suggest though, that conducting the event at Sydney Olympic Park, home to a further 11 of the 28 sports on the World Masters Games programme, ultimately resulted in orienteering achieving an unprecedented level of exposure.

It really was a tremendous vibe and atmosphere."

Credit to orienteering organisers

Shane O'Leary believes that, beyond being at the "home of the Games", a couple of other factors also contributed significantly to the visibility of the event.

"The sprint event was staged on the same day as the opening ceremony so everyone was "up" and many local people, visitors and athletes from different sports were at the Olympic Park precinct. In addition, the anticipation of the opening to be held in the main Olympic Stadium was in the air."

"Sydney Olympic Park is also the showground for the annual Royal Easter Show. Both the start and finish of the sprint orienteering event were in the purpose-built wood chopping arena - a miniature stadium with great viewing and intimacy. It is perhaps the only one of its kind in the world so hard to replicate at future Games, but this really added to the success", Shane O'Leary says and concludes: "Ultimately the success of the sprint event was great credit to the Australian orienteering organisers."

A new Swiss phenomenon

Matthias Müller won gold at the World Orienteering Championships this year, and was second overall in the World Cup. The Swiss star has stepped out of the shadow of Simone Niggli and Daniel Hubmann.

"Daniel and Simone mean a lot to our sport. They have both done incredibly well. The focus is still mostly on Simone, but now I have to do more interviews, and people like to have my autograph more often, which shows that I am getting more recognition than before", says Matthias.

He won a close race for the sprint gold medal at the World Championships in Trondheim. There were just 2.3 seconds from the gold medal winner to Fabian Hertner, also Switzerland, in second place and 7.3 seconds down to Daniel Hubmann in seventh place.

Inspired by large crowd

"I had run a lot of good sprint races ahead of the World Championships. In Trondheim I thought about what I had to do and looked forward to a race with a lot of spectators. And what an audience it was! In the qualification race I got into the right rhythm. In the final I didn't think about anything else than the next control."

"The World Championships gold is a bigger prize for me than being second in the World Cup. But I had a bit of luck at the World Championships: next time I could end up 4th or 7th without being a worse orienteer and in just as good physical shape. Looking back on the season, I can also say that I am more surprised about my 2nd place in the World Cup than the gold at World Championships, because I knew I could win a race, but didn't believe

that I could do well at all distances for the whole season."

Many factors behind **Swiss success**

"We have a very good and wellstructured training programme. We try to improve in all aspects of orienteering through our physical, technical and mental training. Of course it's also good to train in the company of some of the world's best orienteers. We can gain a lot from each other. But probably the most important thing is that we get on so well together in the team. I also like to go to training camps with the national team because I meet some of my best friends there."

"I think it is amazing to see Simone's discipline when it comes to training: both the planning and executing and also the review. She has also worked and worked to reach the top, and continues the work to stay there. I have known Daniel since we were juniors. Even though he has become better and better over the years, he has always stayed the same and can switch between a 'serious' and a 'fun' outlook on life. I think it is very important to enjoy life but be focused when it counts."

Matthias enjoys the spotlight

"I like being in the spotlight. It also motivates me to improve when I know that people are looking at my performances. At the same time I am not invisible any longer when I perform badly! Newspapers also write about that. One week after Trondheim, the Swiss Championships in both sprint and long distance were held. In the sprint I misspunched, and in the long distance race I ended up somewhere far down the result list. After that I had to tell the story of what happened at least 100 times!"

The new Swiss star lives in Oberwil-Lieli,

a small village in the countryside about 15 kilometres west of Zurich. He has been a full-time orienteer since 2006.

Familiar faces and rising stars

Daniel Hubmann won the World Cup overall for the third year in succession. He took one bronze at the World Championships.

Simone Niggli won two golds at the World Championships in Trondheim, and the World Cup overall for the seventh time. Minna Kauppi also won two golds at the World Championships, at middle distance and relay. In the relay she fought hard with Marianne Andersen and Helena Jansson on the last leg, but managed to secure the gold to Finland.

In the men's class, the home crowd went wild when two young rising Norwegian stars, Olav Lundanes and Carl Waaler Kaas both won World Championships gold. However, in the men's relay experience again proved to be the key to success, and the gold went to the Russian team Andrey Khramov, Dmitriy Tsvetkov and Valentin Novikov.

World Cup title in doubt to the end

he fascinatingly close battle for the World Cup title between the top two women in world mountain bike orienteering was the big story in 2010. The fight for the title went right down to the final race.

Michaela Gigon, Austria won the middle distance gold at the World Championships and three World Cup races - one sprint, one middle and one long. Christine Schaffner, Switzerland took the long distance gold at the Championships and also won three World Cup races, again one sprint, one middle and one long! Gigon, who was in second place in the World Cup standings for a large part of the season, snatched the World Cup title in the final race of the season where she took 2nd place, Schaffner having a rare offday finishing 7th.

The final margin in the women's World Cup standings was just 4 points. Schaffner has the consolation of heading the IOF World Rankings at the end of the season, the result of greater success in other World Ranking Events.

Gigon, 33 years old, and Schaffner, 31, both have many years of experience in MTB orienteering.

Tough World Championships in Portugal

The World Championships were held in Montalegre, Portugal in July. A big crowd turned out to watch the sprint races in the historic town of Chaves where the finish was in the local football stadium. The races were won by Anna Kaminska, Poland who was just 2 seconds quicker than Christine Schaffner, and Adrian Jackson, Australia, holding on to his sprint title from 2009. Jackson was unable to take part in the other World Cup rounds, but as in the previous 2 years he made his mark in the Championships with this gold, plus

silver medals at both middle and long distance.

The middle distance final was a bit more strenuous than many competitors expected and winning times were long. Gold medallists were Michaela Gigon and Finland's Samuli Saarela. In the long distance competition there was a qualification race followed by a final. The final was long, steep in places and hot! The courses were characterised by some long legs with very intricate route choices across the hilly and varied terrain of forest and open countryside. Winners here were Christine Schaffner and Anton Foliforov, Russia, who currently heads the men's IOF World Rankings.

In the relays, Denmark came out winners of the women's by an impressive 5 minutes margin ahead of Finland, whilst the men's race was a much closer affair with Russia taking the gold with a 35-second gap from Denmark. In both races the Czech Republic took the bronze medals.

Russia headed the final medals table, with Denmark second and Australia third. The medals were shared amongst 10 nations in all, and 14 nations had an athlete in the top 6 in at least one of the races.

Big developments in 2010

This has been a year of big

developments in elite-level MTB orienteering. The World Cup, restarted after a break of 6 years, had 4 rounds with races in Hungary, Poland, Portugal, and Italy. Many athletes competed in all 13 World Cup races. two of which were mixed relays. The most consistent of the many male riders was Erik Skovgaard Knudsen, Denmark, who won the World Cup overall by 34 points ahead of Samuli Saarela; he made sure of this title in the penultimate race of the individual series. This year also saw the inaugural World Masters Championships, held in Poland.

New IOF map norms for mountain bike orienteering maps were published in 2010. The map norms in all orienteering disciplines are revised at regular intervals, and the new norms take account of latest thinking. It is expected that all nations will use the norms, so that maps all over the world are drawn to similar standards. One aspect of a MTB orienteering map still not agreed world-wide is the symbol or colour tone to be used for an area of land where competitors are allowed to ride, when elsewhere access is allowed only on paths and tracks. Four alternatives will be tried out in competition during the next two years and a decision made in 2012.

Plans for 2011

Next year there will again be a 13-race World Cup series with rounds in Hungary, Sweden, Italy and Russia. Michaela Gigon has already set out her ambition for 2011: more Championship gold medals and another World Cup title!

SKI ORIENTEERING

lga Novikova is the first ever athlete from Kazakhstan to have run in a final at the World Orienteering Championships, but her main sport is ski orienteering. This winter her big ambition is to win her first gold medal at international level. "I want to get my first World Championships gold in ski orienteering", says Olga.

The 25-year-old has been among the very best ski orienteers for some years now. In 2007 she was just one second away from gold in the sprint at the World Ski Orienteering Championships in Russia. The world's best. Tatiana Vlasova, took first place just ahead of Olga. In the same winter, a few weeks before the World Championships, Olga won the sprint at the Open Nordic Championships.

A good year throughout

Olga has impressed everyone both in winter and summer this year. First she achieved third place overall in the Ski Orienteering World Cup. Then in August she qualified for the middle distance final at the World Orienteering Championships in Trondheim, and finished 30th of the 45 finalists: a fine result for a woman who sees winter sport as her first priority.

"It was cool to be at the World Orienteering Championships and nice to be the first ever from Kazakhstan to qualify for a final", she says.

Whilst Olga was in Norway she stayed with some Norwegian ski orienteers and after the World Championships were over, took part in some ski orienteering training with them.

Big targets for 2011

This winter Olga's home country is the host for the multi-sport Asian Winter Games, and this is Olga's target number one. The Games run from January 30th to February 6th. In ski orienteering there are sprint, middle distance, long distance and relay races. The Asian Winter Games have been a big goal for Kazakhstan's national team for a long time.

Seven weeks after the Asian Winter Games, the World Ski Orienteering Championships will take place in the eastern part of Sweden. There, Olga's aim is to win one of the races.

"Everything is going well with my training and my life in general. I am looking forward to the competitions", she says.

At the 2011 World Championships there will be a new discipline in the programme - a mixed sprint relay, with two men and two women in each team.

Names to watch out for

Olga believes that the Russians Tatiana Vlasova and Eduard Khrennikov will be hard to beat again this winter. Vlasova

tried biathlon last winter and didn't participate so much in ski orienteering, but when she did take part she showed that she is still extremely good. Russia provides a lot of other top competitors like Andrey Lamov, who won two gold medals at the World Championships in Japan two years ago, and Natalia Tomilova, last winter's overall World Cup winner.

The Swedes will for sure produce some top-class performances on home ground. Helene Söderlund, Josefine Engström, Erik Rost and Peter Arnesson are four strong athletes from the nation with the blue and yellow flag. The Finns, with Liisa Anttila, Staffan Tunis and Olli-Markus Taivainen in front, and Norway, with athletes like Marte Reenaas, Lars Hol Moholdt, Eivind Tonna and Hans Jørgen Kvåle, are also nations anticipating some success. Christian Spoerry is a big Swiss hope, especially in sprint races.

2010 was a landmark year for trail orienteering. For the first time, competitors in the World Trail Orienteering Championships and the World Orienteering Championships shared a major finish arena.

Granåsen Ski Centre at Trondheim in Norway was the venue for the finish of the Long Distance Final of the World Orienteering Championships and also the second day of the World Trail Orienteering Championships. Both the paralympic and open class trail orienteering competitors used a special finish lane alongside the World Orienteering Championships race run-in, in full view of all the spectators present, and were regularly shown on

the big arena screen and identified by the arena commentators. 95 competitors from 20 nations enjoyed being in the spotlight for a few minutes as they came to the finish at the end of an exhausting 2 hours or more in the forest.

Yes, one can get exhausted in trail orienteering! It's not physical tiredness - wheelchair users are allowed a helper to get through the terrain, and the course lengths are rarely more than 2 km. But concentrating on minute map detail, matching the map to the terrain and making decisions between flags placed only a very short distance from each other, on timed controls under direct time pressure too, has its effect on the brain. Recovery time afterwards is quick, but mistakes on the last controls on a course, caused purely by fatigue and a fast-approaching

maximum allowed time, are quite common.

in the spotlight

Busy August

It was a busy August for the world's trail orienteers. The month started with the European Trail Orienteering Championships held in Alfta in the Hälsingland region of Sweden. Here the terrain was typically Swedish with many very large boulders littered across a multitude of small valleys and spurs, on mainly open land with few trees. This meant that some control clusters could be sited a considerable distance from the viewing points. Only the timed controls were in forested terrain, and these were very difficult, with many mistakes made through over-hasty decision-making, even by the most skilled competitors. At the end of the two days these proved to be decisive to

the distribution of the medals. Winners were Ola Jansson, Sweden (paralympic) and Hannu Niemi, Finland (open).

Most of the competitors then travelled directly to Trondheim for the World Trail Orienteering Championships. Day 1 of the championships was in typical rocky and detailed Norwegian forest which was part of a school grounds with several routes suitable for wheelchair users. The area provided a wide variety of trail orienteering problems, with the competitors having to use all the different techniques available to them to achieve success. Overall leader of the paralympic class at the end of day I was Søren Saxtorph, Denmark, having his most successful championships to date. Libor Forst. Czech Republic led the open class.

Day 2 was in an area largely without rock detail but with constant change between forest, semi-open and open land. Here as on day 1, some of the techniques needed for correct solution were very subtle. Ola Jansson came to the fore on this day with an errorfree performance which brought him the gold medal, a repeat of his result in the first World Trail Orienteering Championships on home ground in 2004. Stig Gerdtman made it a double for Sweden by taking gold in the open class, the only competitor with no wrong answers, and it was no surprise that Sweden also took the team gold medals ahead of Finland and Croatia.

The 2-day championship event was followed by the inaugural World TempO Trophy.

Søren Saxtorph – medal winner from Denmark

Denmark's first-ever World Trail Orienteering Championships medal, a bronze, was won this year by Søren Saxtorph competing in the paralympic class. He led the competition with an error-free round on Day 1, but four mistakes on Day 2 brought him down to third place behind Ola Jansson and Lennart Wahlgren, both from Sweden. "There were some very tricky controls today", said Søren at the end of Day 2. "At times there seemed to be one solution from one angle but a different solution from another."

Søren first heard of trail orienteering when he was an elite foot orienteer, but regarded it as a bit elementary. It was at a summer holiday course two years ago that he found out that it wasn't like that at all – that technically it was just as challenging as foot orienteering. "The map reading is similar but more complex, and the post-event chat – discussing the course and individual controls – is much the same as in foot orienteering", Søren says.

Søren was one of the best junior foot orienteers in Denmark, and competed in a Junior World Championships in Sweden. He met his wife Maria through orienteering, and until Søren was injured in a bathing accident 7 years ago and became partly paralysed and wheelchair-bound, they were both active foot orienteers.

Now they have found another sport where they can both take part on equal terms. "It's really 'hard-core' map-reading, and it's great to get out into the terrain again", says 40-year-old Søren. Trail orienteering now provides him with the chances for travel and outdoor life that he was beginning to miss. In the past two

summer holidays Søren and Maria have gone with their two children to trail orienteering events abroad, primarily in Sweden where there is really tough competition at elite level.

What is the reason you were so successful in Trondheim?

"The maps were excellent, and the courses were a fine combination of contour reading and using sight lines and bearings. But a very important factor for me was that the tracks and paths were so good. I could move around in my electric wheelchair without having to worry about getting stuck or falling over. So I was able to concentrate 100% on the orienteering."



Organisers of future IOF events appointed

The XXV General Assembly appointed Italy organiser of the World Orienteering Championships and World Trail Orienteering Championships 2014. The events will be held in the Asiago-Lavarone highlands in Northern Italy.

Estonia was appointed organiser of the World Mountain Bike Orienteering Championships and Junior World Mountain Bike Orienteering Championships 2013.

The IOF Council appointed Great Britain organiser of the World Trail Orienteering Championships 2012. The World Trail Orienteering Championships will be staged in Scotland in early summer 2012.

Barbados IOF member No. 71

The XXV IOF General Assembly, held on 13 August 2010 at the time of the World Orienteering Championships in Trondheim, Norway, endorsed the IOF Council's decision to approve Barbados as a member. The IOF now has 71 member federations.

IOF Council elections

At the XXV IOF General Assembly, Åke Jacobson (SWE) was re-elected President of the International Orienteering Federation for the Congress period 2010–2012. Leho Haldna (EST), Brian Porteous (GBR) and Marcel Schiess (SUI) were elected Vice Presidents. Michael Dowling (AUS), Vincent Frey (FRA), Jaeyoung 'Eliot' Lee (KOR), Timo Ritakallio (FIN), Astrid Waaler Kaas (NOR), Maria Silvia Viti (ITA), and Laszlo Zentai (HUN) were appointed Council members. The retiring IOF Senior Vice President Hugh Cameron (AUS) was appointed Honorary Member of the IOF.

One membership class

The General Assembly approved proposed amendments to the IOF Statutes. The IOF now has only one membership class. Provisional members have the same rights as members except that they may not vote at the General Assembly, nor nominate candidates for Council. All member federations can compete in all IOF events, including World Championships.

Continued support for strong IOF participation in World Masters Games

Orienteering is currently included in the programmes of the World Games and the World Masters Games. The presence of the IOF in these two multi-sport Games has improved credibility and recognition for orienteering on the world sporting stage. The General Assembly confirmed the current policy of organising the World Masters Orienteering Championships in conjunction with the World Masters Games every fourth year.





A project to develop **future World Orienteering** Championships

After the General Assembly in Prostejov, Czech Republic in 2008, an Evaluation of Elite Events project was launched. An extensive survey of opinions on Elite Events Programme was carried out online in 2009. The survey included 35 questions and got 466 replies from 42 nations in all 6 IOF Regions. Most replies - 55 % - came from athletes. The results were presented at the Presidents' Conference in 2009.

Based on the survey answers, the IOF Council presented guiding principles for a new World Orienteering Championships programme at the General Assembly in Trondheim, Norway in August 2010. The three guiding principles were: the programme should diversify, the World Championships week should remain within eight days, and a new relay should be introduced.

A project group has now been set up to develop a new detailed programme for the World Orienteering Championships. A draft programme is going to be presented at the Presidents' Conference in France in August 2011.

Gueorgiou, Nordberg and Smola awarded International Fair **Play Diploma** of Honour

The athletes Thierry Gueorgiou (FRA), Anders Nordberg (NOR) and Michal Smola (CZE) were recognised by the International Committee for Fair Play for their sportsmanship during the World Orienteering Championships relay in Hungary in 2009. The three athletes were fighting for gold medal on the last leg in the World Championships relay, but sacrificed their own and their nation's medal possibilities when stopping to assist an injured fellow competitor.

Gueorgiou, Nordberg and Smola received the Fair Play Diploma in the category Act of Fair Play.

The International Committee for Fair Play is an international non-governmental organisation recognised by the International Olympic Committee. The goal of the International Committee for Fair Play (CIFP) is the world-wide defence and promotion of fair play.
